# The Flower Coaster

COASTER 03

FINISHED SIZE Approx. 5"

SEAM ALLOWANCE 1/4" (6mm)

□ Small pointy scissors

### FABRIC & MATERIALS

- □ Front Fabric 6" × 6"
   □ Back Fabric 6" × 6"
   □ Centre Circle Fabric 2½" × 2½"
   □ Fusible Fleece (e.g. Pellon 987f)
- ☐ Woven Fusible Interfacing 6" × 6"(e.g. Pellon SF101)

To prevent fabric stretching

□ Fusible Web (e.g. Pellon  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " ×  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " Wonder Under 805)

A paper backed webbing that turns fabric into an iron-on patch

- ☐ Perle 8 thread in a matching colour
- ☐ Piece of lace or ribbon 3" long
- □ **Button** 10mm


### REQUIRED TOOLS

- ☐ Sharp scissors

  - ☐ Fabric glue
- □ Pins

☐ Large eye needle (e.g. applique No. 9)

### · Step 1

### Cut Out Your Project

Print the Flower Coaster Templates from pages 7 & 8 of this pattern.

Make sure your printer is set to 100% (actual size) with scaling turned off. Check the scale square—it should measure exactly 1" x 1".

Cut out the **Templates** for the **Front** and **Back**, the **Fleece**, and the **Flower Centre Fusible Web**.

Trace the templates onto the wrong side (WS) of your fabric.

- ☐ [1] Front fabric piece (Fig. 1.)
- ☐ [1] **Back** fabric piece
- ☐ [1] Flower Centre piece
- □ Poke through the [4] placement dots on the **Front Template** with a pin, and mark these on the WS of the **Front** fabric.

Using the smaller Interfacing & Fleece Template, trace:

- ☐ [1] piece of Woven Interfacing
- ☐ [1] piece **Fleece**

Using the Fusible Web Template trace:


☐ [1] piece of **Fusible Web** 

Cut out your pieces with sharp scissors. Set the Flower Centre fabric and Fusible Web aside until Step 6, Set the Stitching Template aside until Step 8.



Woven fusible interfacing adds structure and stability to woven fabric.

It helps the fabric hold its shape without changing the texture or making it stiff, and supports areas that need extra strength—like the curves and points on the Flower shape.

# • Step 2

Add the Interfacing & Fleece

- ☐ Lay your **Back** fabric **wrong side (WS)** up.
- ☐ Lay the **Woven Interfacing** with the *glue side* down and centre it evenly on the fabric. Press with an iron until it is firmly adhered. Fig. 2
- ☐ Place the **Fusible Fleece**, over the **Interfacing**, aligning the edges of the shapes, *glue side down* and press (using a pressing cloth or scrap fabric to protect it from direct heat.) *Fig. 3.*





### • *Step 3*

Layer, Trace & Pin

- ☐ Lay the Front fabric right side up (RSU) and place the Back piece on top, right sides together (RST). (Remember, the batting is still on the outside.) Fig. 4.
- ☐ Centre the **Fleece Template** over the Back again and trace around it again to mark your stitching line. Fig. 5.
- ☐ Pin the layers together around the edges. Make sure the layers are smooth and the edges are aligned.
- ☐ Sew along the marked line right around the flower shape (this will be a 1/4" seam allowance). Stop with your needle down at each petal point and lift the presser foot, then readjust the fabric before sewing the next curve. Remember to backstitch when you get back to the beginning to secure the stitches. Fig. 6.



### • Step 4

Trim & Turn


- ☐ Trim the seam allowance down by half to reduce bulk.
- ☐ Clip into the **seam allowance** at each petal point up to the stitching but not through it. Fig. 7.
- ☐ Connect each pair of marked dots on the **Front** to form an X. Fig. 8.
- ☐ Carefully cut along each marked line on the Front fabric, pulling the layers apart to be sure not to cut the Back layer. Fig. 9.


This time we will turn the Coaster right side out through the hole in the centre of the Front. Then we'll cover this hole with the flower centre using raw edge applique.


☐ Turn right side out (RSO) through the opening. Use your fingers or a point turner

to reach in through the opening and gently shape each petal, pushing the layers of the seam all the way out to the edge.

Clipping into an internal point (like between flower petals) allows the seam to spread open fully when turned right side out. This releases the tension at the join, helping the fabric lie flat and preventing puckering or pulling.

### • *Step 5*

### Press and Shape

Press your coaster flat with your iron, working carefully around the shape. Aim to get the seam to sit right on the edge so no backing fabric peeks out to the front—or vice versa.

Keep shaping the petals and pressing the edge until you get an even, well-defined shape—it makes all the difference to the finished look. Make sure all the raw edges of the turning opening are sitting flat and are not tucked inside.

# • *Step 6*

Prepare the Flower Centre

We're going to prepare the 'patch' to cover the hole in the **Front** of your coaster.

☐ Lay your Flower Centre fabric wrong side up (WSU) and place the Fusible Web glue side down on top

Fusible web is a thin, double-sided adhesive paper that adds a layer of glue to the back of your fabric when pressed with an iron. It holds your appliqué securely in place for stitching.

- ☐ Fuse the **Web** in place with an iron. *Fig.* 11.
- □ Cut the circle shape out of the **Flower Centre Template**, and trace it onto your **Fusible Web**. Cut out the circle. *Fig. 12.*
- ☐ Peel off the backing paper from the wong side (WS) of the fabric.





### • Step 7

Attach the Flower Centre

- □ Place the fabric circle *glue side down*, over the opening in the **Front** (centering this by eye). **Press** to fuse it in place. *Fig. 13*.
- ☐ Stitch around the circle close to the raw edge to attach it to the **Front**. *Fig.* 14.

### Stitches you can use:

- A small straight stitch close to the edge (raw edge appliqué)
- A short zigzag stitch
- A row of hand stitching for an extra handmade touch.




Raw-edge appliqué means stitching along the raw edge of the fabric directly onto your project. The fabric may fray slightly with time which adds to the handmade charm.


### • Step 8

### Add Decorative Hand Stitching

Trace the **Stitching Template** onto the **Front** side of your coaster. *Fig.* 15.

Thread your needle with **Perle 8 cotton** and hand sew a row of **running stitch**, following the traced line around the edge, making your stitches about  $\frac{1}{8}$ "- $\frac{1}{4}$ " long. (See full details for this in the **Circle Coaster**.) *Fig.* 16.

### • Step 9

### Optional Embellishment


To finish, you can add further charm to your Flower Coaster with embellishments:


- □ Take a 1½" long piece of lace and fold both the edges into the centre. Glue baste them in place.

  Pick a spot on the edge of the flower and fold the lace around the edge so the edges are even on both sides. Fig. 17.
- □ OR Glue baste each side in place.

  Machine sew along the inner edge of the lace to secure.

Sew a button on one side to further secure the lace tag for a delicate, cottage-style detail.





# • Step 10

Celebrate & Share

This final design has reinforced what you've learned and added even more skills to your toolkit.

Along the way, you've learned essential sewing techniques —and also why they matter.






